## ART EXHIBITION

### Petite art makes a big statement in Fells Point

Artists from all over the country have been thinking small and sending their work to The Art Gallery of Fells Point. An artists' cooperative in the heart of historic Fells Point, the gallery presents their 23rd annual North American Miniature Art Exhibition through Oct. 29.

"We'll be in the neighborhood of 100 entrants this year, and have well over 200 pieces," show organizer Tony McClellan said. "Last

year we had 23 states, as well as Canada and Mexico, represented."

The show, open to all residents in North America 18 years and older, accepted all media but photography. Artists could enter up to three works. Two-dimensional pieces couldn't be larger than 4 inches by 6 inches. Three-dimensional works were limited to 8 inches or less in any direction.

"Miniature art is astounding," McClellan said. "I'm told that some of the [art] is done with brushes of a single bristle."

Artist Ann Ruppert has entered three pieces in the show — a torso, a seated figure and a bird on a log. "I go from one extreme

# Find a little Paris on Charles Street

When it first opened, Sofi's Crepes closely resembled the tiny crepe stands of Paris. Owner Ann Costlow, a former finance professional, had visited France and fallen in love with the delicacy.

With time, as Costlow's crepe craze caught on in Baltimore, it was not unusual to see long lines stretching down Charles Street during busy times. Earlier this year, Costlow made the wise decision to expand. As a result, Sofi's now has seating at tables and a counter, and walls that showcase regularly rotating artwork by local artists.

Crepes can be more than just sweet desserts. They can be main courses for dinner or quick snacks around lunch as well. Their portability makes them extremely convenient, especially when you can take them next door to The Charles for a movie.

The fresh and natural fillings offered at Sofi's venture well beyond the usual cheese, chocolate and fruit fillings, providing a well-rounded selection able to suit a variety of tastes and appetites.

The crepe Florentine (\$8), a time-honored favorite, has been touched

up uniquely with some sunflower seeds and a cilantro-Parmesan sauce.

The BBQ shredded pork and cheddar cheese crepe (\$8) and copious Godfather (\$8), loaded with pepperoni, mozzarella, salami, roasted red peppers and spinach, are two of our favorites.

Craving something sweet? The Plain Jane (\$4) with a choice of cinnamon or lemon with sugar is sure to please, and delightful concoctions such as the Turtle (\$5), stuffed with caramel, chocolate and nuts, will not disappoint.
